TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST Dec 2013

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2013.

Trustees

Trustees who served during the year were as follows: -

Appointment of Trustees is governed by the Constitution of the Charity.

Investment Powers

The Constitution authorises the Trustees to make and hold investments using the general funds of the Charity, but no such investments are presently held.

Structure, governance and management

The Charity is established by written constitution and its objects are:

The relief of sickness and poverty of elderly, disabled, sick or infirm persons, and their carers, within the United Kingdom, by offering assistance to enable those in need to secure Respite Care.

The policy of the Charity continues to be to seek additional finance and support to run the Charity for the benefit of current and future beneficiaries. The Trustees delegate the day-to-day responsibility for managing the Charity to the Chief Executive/Administrator Mr Preston Keeling FinstF.

The Charity was registered with the Charity Commission on May 16th 2001.

Reserves

The policy of the Trustees as adopted on December 19th 2004 is to work toward the building of Reserves which it is anticipated would be equal to the likely expenditure of the Charity for a period of six months, this sum is currently estimated to be £35,000 (reviewed annually). Actual Reserves at the commencement of the year covered by this Report stood at £32,769, and at the end of the 2013 Financial Year the amount held in that account, including interest, stood at £33,098. The reserve account is operated through Scottish Widows Bank plc.

Objectives and Summary of activities in their support

As described in our Governing document the objectives of the Charity remain as follows:

The relief of sickness and poverty of elderly, disabled, sick or infirm persons, and their carers, within the United Kingdom, by offering assistance to enable those in need to secure Respite Care.

In support of the above objectives our main activities during this reporting/accounting period have continued to involve us enabling Carers to obtain alternative care, either in the home or via residential provision, for the person or persons (almost always a close family member) for whom they normally provide assistance so that they may take a much need break to recharge their batteries. We continue to work closely with a number of other charities and with an increasing number of various Statutory Authorities, whilst ensuring that our help is in <u>addition</u> to their funding <u>not</u> a replacement.

Achievements and performance

This year has been a very successful year for the charity as once again we were able to help an increased number of carers and their families and the year also saw the launch of our new free holiday for carer's scheme. Whilst our core activity remains the provision of an alternative means of support for the person being cared for thereby enabling the usual family Carer to obtain a much needed break, we reported in 2012 that thanks to the support and generosity of a number of Corporate and Charitable Trust donors we had been able to purchase an excellent static caravan through which we would be able to offer suitable carers a free holiday. The scheme was launched in March 2013 with our excellent static caravan based in Skegness at The Richmond Holiday Centre and has proved phenomenally successful

being fully booked throughout the season, with us having more requests from some clients than we have were able to fulfil. Clients have been brought to us by a number of other charities and by various Social Services Departments around the country, all of whom recognised the real value of the scheme but had no previous access to anything like it. Some of the families we were able to help had several children one of whom was heavily disabled requiring a very high level of attention from the parents. We are now able to help, not only with some alternative provision for the disabled child (thereby freeing up time for the parents), but are able to offer the family a break during which they can spend some real quality time with the able bodied child/children who often get inadvertently overlooked. Other clients benefiting from this new scheme have included a number of elderly carers who have been caring for a spouse suffering from Dementia and other similar conditions, who desperately need a little "me time" to enable them to continue in their caring role. Some of the correspondence from those who have benefited from the holidays confirms the real value of the project.

The success of the scheme was so encouraging that in August the Trustees launched an appeal to raise the money for the purchase of a further unit, this achieved its target just before Christmas and it is expected that the second holiday caravan will be purchased so that it can be available for clients in time for at least part of the 2014 holiday season. It is likely that the second holiday caravan will be sited somewhere on the North West coast of England in order that we can widen the area of benefit giving easier access for carers in the North West. The Trustees are always anxious to ensure that they achieve good value for money in all that we do, and the ability to provide a stressed Carer and their family with a week's (free) holiday at a cost of just £200 (this figure includes an allowance to cover a replacement caravan in the future) to our Charity demonstrates just that, especially when one considers that a commercially purchased week at the Skegness site in August would cost around £700, putting such a holiday outside many families' reach as those caring for a loved one tend to be on very low incomes.

As mentioned in our Annual Report last year, the number of people coming to us for the actual provision of Respite Care and advice on how to access any statutory provision continues to increase year on year. We are very grateful to the many Charitable Trusts, organisations and individuals who supported our work during 2013. We would once again like to add a very special note of thanks to the Trustees of the Robert McAlpine Foundation for their important support for our work over recent years.

2014 will be a challenging year for us with ever greater numbers of clients coming to us for much needed help and the launch of our second holiday facility the workload on our staff also increases and we are grateful to them for their hard work and loyalty. The cut backs in Local Government spending continue to impact on carers in a significant way and we expect that this situation will worsen throughout the year.

Planned actions for 2014

It remains our intention to continue bringing relief to as many individuals and families through Respite Care Provision as we can throughout the coming year. We continue to concentrate on maintaining and further developing the provision of direct assistance to Carers in what we expect to be difficult financial circumstances during 2014. As mentioned above we aim to launch our second Free Holiday scheme somewhere in the North West of England during the summer of 2014.

Statement of Public Benefit

The work of the Respite Association benefits significant numbers of Carers, these being persons who are caring for someone who is terminally ill, long-term sick, physically or mentally disabled. The Charity helps Carers without any bias regarding sex, age, religion or ethnicity. The help provided benefits not only the Carer but frequently the whole of their family. Many Carers of young disabled or sick children have other children who are unintentionally neglected due to the degree of attention required for the other child, our Respite Care breaks allow the parents to spend quality time with such children. The provision of a Respite Break for a Carer also has a beneficial effect for the person who they usually care for who may otherwise become distressed at the degree of stress (physical and mental) the Carer maybe be suffering.

Risk Assessment

The Board receives a report from the CEO/Administrator on any perceived Risks both Physical and Financial. The ill health suffered by our CEO during the latter part of 2011 and the need for him to undergo major surgery to remove a cancerous tumour in 2012 meant that the Associations Chairman felt it appropriate to produce a plan to cover the CEO's health, this report had been endorsed by the Trustee Board in consultation with the CEO. During 2013 the CEO completed all his surgical and chemotherapy treatments and is now in remission and monitored by the NHS on a six monthly cycle, we trust his health will now be stable but our risk plan remains in place to cover any eventuality relating to his health. At present no other significant risks have been identified apart from the obvious need to monitor our financial situation ever more closely given the current economic climate.

Investment Policy

The Charity currently needs to continue building its small reserves in order to meet the targeted sum (see Reserves policy above). Currently the Reserves are held in an Account with Scottish Widows Bank plc; however it is the intention of The Trustee Board continues to monitor whether this is the safest and most productive vehicle for its money especially given the current worldwide economic difficulties.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2013

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation of accounts

The Charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed. The accounts are prepared on a Receipts and Payments Basis.

Income

Voluntary income and donations are accounted for as received by the Charity. No permanent endowments have been received in the period.

Value added tax

Value added tax is not recoverable by the Charity, and as such is included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Fixed assets/Depreciation

The Charity owns three computers and two laser printers, plus two tablets and some basic office equipment. It also owns a Static Caravan based at the Richmond Holiday Centre in Skegness, Lincs. Computer/office equipment is depreciated over 3 years and the caravan over 10 years.

Office Rent

Office accommodation is provided at a greatly subsidised cost by The Holbeach St Marks Community Association. For security and privacy reasons mail is still forwarded to the home address of our Administrator.

Fundraising

The cost of Fundraising is equal to 3.9% of our income, a decrease over last year (4.9%) and a figure that we think demonstrates the tight control the Trustee Board and its staff keep over expenditure in all forms. We believe that it is unrealistic to expect the figure to drop significantly lower given the increase in such things as postage and printing.

6 Restricted Income
